

Come on in — oh, don't worry about taking your boots off. Just grab a plate and steal a spot next to the fireplace. We hope you brought your best stories.

In Jasper, community is everything. It's what enables the most memorable mountain explorations. It's what brings local service to an above-and-beyond level where a small business owner will close shop for the day to ensure your injured son visiting from overseas gets checked into the hospital okay (yes, this actually happened). It's what makes Jasper more than just a pretty face.

Of course, Jasper *is* a very pretty face. Crystalline lakes ringed by mountains, gorges sculpted by eons of time and water, and more wildlife than you can shake a camera at — it's no wonder the national park is a designated UNESCO World Heritage Site.





Jasper National Park is an exceptional place that offers unforgettably authentic experiences for those who are willing to leave the beaten path. Reaching the destination can be a remarkable adventure in its own right, and memories created on road trips are classic and lasting. To the east and west of Jasper runs the perfectly paved Trans-Canada Highway 16, also known as the Yellowhead. The famously scenic Icefields Parkway stretches to the south, connecting Jasper to Lake Louise and Banff National Park. So pack your bags and crank some driving tunes - the open road is waiting.

The Icefields Parkway,

5 tips for

icefields

also known as Highway 93, is famous for its scenic mountain views. But visitors who only journey the route in summer miss out on the sparkling winter beauty that defines the true Canadian Rockies. That said, to witness epic glaciers, frozen waterfalls and ice-covered lakes, some important precautions must be taken.

1. Confirm road

conditions Weather on the Icefields Parkway can be quite different than surrounding areas, so check Alberta's Official Road Reports (no internet? Dial 511 on your phone for any updates).

2. Watch for wildlife

Part of the Icefields Parkway runs through winter caribou habitat. Maintain the speed limit and always be aware of your surroundings to help protect this at-risk species.

3. Fill up on gas before leaving None of the gas stations between Jasper and Banff operate in winter.

Also, snow tires are mandatory from November 1st to April 1st.

4. Leave early

Allow plenty of leisure time to fully enjoy the jaw-dropping views along the way. You won't regret taking a moment to safely pull off to a roadside stop to snap a few more pictures.

5. Bring supplies

There's no cell phone reception along parts of the highway, so always bring an emergency kit that includes (but is not limited to): extra warm clothing, extra food and water.





welcome to the ultimate playground

The mountains are our jungle gym, monkey bars and slide all in one. This is a land of vear-round recess. With thousands of kilometers of trails that cater to diverse activity levels, and which explore everything from canyons to peaks to lakes to rock walls to downtown Jasper, the national park has something for everyone and anyone who wants to get their body moving in the great outdoors.



Ski Marmot Basin

To truly love Jasper, one must love winter. To love winter, one must experience Marmot Basin. In fact, for over 55 years this beloved ski resort has specialized in making people flip head over heels for Jasper's chilliest season (and not just metaphorically - Marmot's three terrain parks are an adrenaline junkie's dream).

Though locals have dubbed it simply "the hill," don't be deceived. Marmot Basin boasts the highest base elevation of any ski area in Canada, and has such stunning panoramic views of the surrounding UNESCO World Heritage Site that you'll have to unbury your jaw from where it drops into the dry, fluffy snow. Over 450 centimetres of this white gold falls on





Marmot Basin from November until May.

It's no wonder that Jasper was voted North America's best ski town in 2018 by USA Today readers. It takes more than great access to the slopes, top-notch ski infrastructure and droolworthy après-ski restaurants to win alpine aficionados' hearts from across the continent. There's also a smalltown authenticity and unpretentious vibe here that makes people feel at home.

Marmot Basin has fostered Jasper's ski culture since the 1940's, when the British Army used the area for alpine training manoeuvres (two decades later an old disassembled army truck would find new life as a tow rope). Today, the ski resort offers multiple ski clubs for all ages and abilities, along with a number of fun events like the Aloha Cup and Pride Ski.

With 91 runs that are divided (category-wise) almost equally between novice, intermediate, advanced and expert level, three mountain chalets and virtually no lift lines, Marmot Basin has something for everyone.

Every type of cyclist will find a steed to suit their style at The Bench Bike Shop; this friendly independent nook on Patricia St. is known for its unique bikes (both for sale and rental), expert mechanic service, welcome-to-all atmosphere, and knowledgeable adventure recommendations. On recommended rides

If you want a challenging but beautiful road route, my go-to is biking to Maligne Lake. It's uphill most of the way there (which makes the return trip to town awfully fun) and it's just gorgeous. From Jasper to the lake is nearly 50 kilometres so some people might get back in four hours, some might take the full day.

On fat biking


I use my fat bike year-round, but a great winter biking experience is to lap the trail around Lac Beauvert, then go for a hot chocolate in the Fairmont Jasper Park Lodge's Emerald Lounge. Darkness falls early and fast in winter, so go in a group and bring a light. And please don't ride in the xc ski tracks.



On trail etiquette

If approaching any other trail user, stop and dismount in case the other person is uncomfortable with a bike coming toward them. Stay on the trails and don't go off-route. Be bear aware and make noise at regular intervals. Lastly, remember to stop every once in a while and just soak up the scenery around you.

Athabasca River (Mile 5)

Class 2 Approx. 9 km

Excellent introduction to whitewater rafting This 2 hour round trip (1 hour river time) is fun for everyone from age 6 to 90. Encounter many Class 2 white water rapids.

Class 2 Approx. 15 km

Great canyon views and extended white water enjoyment.

This 3 hour round trip (1.5 hour river time) contains numerous Class 2 white water rapids and begins at the base of the Athabasca Falls.

Sunwapta River

Class 3+ Approx. 10 km

Challenging for physically active adventure seekers. The first half of this trip is gentle and scenic, the latter portion has sustained larger waves. This run is very challenging and is tailored for those who are physically fit and strong swimmers.

National park licensed guides, wet suits, life jackets, paddle jackets, neoprene booties, wind pants, touques and neoprene mitts are available for inclement weather. All you need to bring is enthusiasm, a bathing suit or shorts and a T-shirt.

Go on a family-friendly Western adventure by exploring the rugged beauty of the Rocky Mountains from atop a saddle. Jasper Riding Stables offers tours with sweeping views aboard gentle horses hand-picked for each rider's experience level. Lovable steeds like Apache, Thunder, and Sultan help equestrians as young as 6 years old get a taste for the cowboy lifestyle. Try the one hour ride to the Athabasca Outlook, which serves up river valley vistas and three mountain ranges on a silver platter. The two hour Ridgeline and Cottonwood Loop adds some beaver dams and waterfowl to the mix, while the three hour Cowboy's Way excursion offers the scenery of the first two rides and more, ensuring you return home with a darn good yarn. 4 scientific reasons Jasper is good for you

How being in the mountains can have a positive impact on life and generally make people happier and healthier.

It doesn't take a huge leap of faith to imagine that most people in Jasper are happy. For starters, unless you're one of the approximate 5,000 people who live here, then you're likely to be on vacation. But according to recent research, the reason(s) you see so many smiles in the national park goes beyond simply having a break from the day-to-day routine of home.

Intuitively, we know that nature is good for us. We go outside and, barring any surprise wilderness emergencies, we feel better. Thanks to scientific advances and fast-growing interest in the topic, we're learning more and more about why being in nature has such positive effects.

The results are so impressive that medical professionals around the world have started prescribing time in nature. In Japan, 'forest bathing' has become a common therapeutic treatment. In Scotland, physicians sometimes add hiking to the recommended treatment plan for those suffering from anxiety and depression. In the United States, some researchers decry the rise of 'nature deficit disorder' among screenaddicted children. In Jasper, even the mayor follows the town's unofficial motto: a bike ride a day keeps the doctor away.

The good news is that evidence suggests benefits can come from even small doses of "ecotherapy"; as little as a 15 minute walk in a park can have a positive effect (just imagine the boost you'd get from a sojourn in the Jasper backcountry). In case you needed more of a reason to visit Jasper, here are four scientifically supported ways Jasper helps you be a better you.









1. Reduce stress

Know that calm feeling you get on the trail? The exact cause isn't certain (is it the soothing sounds of bird call? The aromatic phytoncides released by trees? A combination of both, and much more?) but when scientists measure people's physiological stress markers before and after spending time in green spaces, results often show lowered levels of the stress hormone cortisol post-nature.

2. Increase fitness


According to multiple Canadian reports, when kids are outside they're more likely to be in motion. All that informal exercise (aka playtime) builds cardiovascular health, strengthens muscles and spurs the production of "feel-good" neurotransmitters like endorphins. These in turn often cause a domino effect of other healthy outcomes, like better sleep and lower risk of developing type II diabetes.

3. Better relations

As nice as it is to savour some alone time in the woods, spending time in nature can also help your personal relationships too. A study published in the journal Personality and Social Psychology Bulletin, reported that when participants were exposed to natural environments then they rated community, close relationships and generosity as more highly valued than they had previously.


4. Benefit world


When people spend time out in nature and experience the associated health boosts, they're more likely to want to preserve those spaces. This helps protect wildernesses like Jasper National Park, which science is showing can hugely impact public health. If even one more person ventures into nature, it could start a positive feedback loop that affects society for generations.

For the mature traveler, Jasper presents a unique opportunity for extraordinary experiences that balance mountain exploration with comfort and security. Hop in a Harley-Davidson sidecar, tram to the top of a mountain or float in the wake of early pioneers; you're never too old to try something new.



Hop aboard one of Jasper Raft Tours' iconic orange rafts and follow the same scenic river route used by fur traders more than two centuries ago — but without any of the early pioneers' pesky backbreaking labour. In fact, a trip down the Athabasca River with this family-friendly rafting company is so leisurely and safe that everyone





Tours run daily in spring and fall (May 10-June 30; Sept. 10-Oct. 6) and twice daily in summer (July 1-Sept. 9). Transportation to river included. from toddlers to 97-year-olds to people in wheelchairs can participate (Jasper Raft Tours even organizes an annual excursion for the local seniors' lodge).

Following a calm section of the river in seven-meter-long rafts designed for excellent stability and comfort, these two to three hour trips (transportation time included) feature one hour to 90 minutes of time on the river, depending on the water levels, and are great for those looking for a more mild adventure. National park licensed guides lead the tours and along the way will educate rafters about the fascinating history of this designated Canadian Heritage River. The guide also handles all the rowing, allowing you to sit back, relax and search the shore for wildlife; there is always a chance of seeing elk, deer, moose, coyotes,

wolves, eagles, ospreys, mountain goat and bears.

Although most of the trip follows calm stretches of the river, there are a few slightly rowdier sections where small rapids can cast an errant splash (followed shortly by delighted squeals aboard the raft). As such, participants are encouraged to wear casual clothing and footwear that they don't mind getting a bit wet.

Tours operate rain or shine, with ponchos provided in the case of the former. Rafting is one of those activities that's just as fun with a little precipitation — you're surrounded by water anyway!

Spot wildlife with SunDog Tour Co.

Part of the reason Jasper was declared a UNESCO World Heritage Site is because of the abundant wildlife that call the national park home. And while there's always the possibility of spotting an elk or bear on your own, a professional wildlife watching tour will take guests to lesser known areas of the park and increase your chances. They'll also give a more well-rounded understanding of the local fauna.

SunDog Tour Co. schedules their wildlife tours for morning and evening times when animals are most likely to be up and about. Primarily a minicoach tour with minimal walking (total duration is three to three and a half hours), this tour is also a great way to see some of the park's most beautiful scenery.

Although it's impossible to guarantee a sighting, the guides are well trained to find the park's iconic animals both big and small, and will throughout the tour explain how these wild creatures contribute to the rich history, geology and ecology of Jasper National Park and how they survive the mountain winters.

When a furry friend does appear, photographers will appreciate the tour bus' oversized sightseeing windows. Some vehicles even have sliding windows so you can get that perfectly unobstructed, once-in-a-lifetime shot.

Before he started leading visitors on wildlife tours, this born-and-raised Albertan was a park warden and wildlife manager. Here he shares part of why his job is so special:

On the tours' bonus perks

We pass around sheep horns, elk antlers, beaver hides and bear claws so people can actually feel each species. Plus a sighting location log tells guides about recent spottings.

On his favourite animal

Elk. I love all the other animals too, but a big male elk with giant antlers is iconic and when you see a nursery group of mothers and calves, people melt.

On safety

All guides go through a training program to ensure we don't disturb wildlife or put people in danger. Learn more (p. 34).

Everywhere you look in Jasper is a photo opportunity, but these nine spots are known for being particularly photogenic.










Mountain Galleries

It can be hard to capture a place as beautiful as Jasper National Park with a photograph. How can you replicate the overwhelming awe and sublime wonder this place inspires with a t-shirt? Enter: art.

At Mountain Galleries, extraordinary, one-of-a-kind paintings and sculptures help give shape to feelings that can arise during a once-in-alifetime vacation to the Canadian Rockies. Art is a visual and cultural

reflection of a place, but the pieces available for purchase here don't simply duplicate Jasper's landscapes, waterfall for waterfall or peak for peak. Created by top Canadian artists (including some locals) who have explored and been influenced by the region, the artworks get into the soul of Jasper, and are the ultimate souvenir.

Since opening its doors in 1992, Mountain Galleries has expanded to locations in Banff, Whistler and Stratford, Ont. The flagship Jasper gallery is located on the first floor of the Fairmont Jasper Park Lodge, has long hours (it's often open until 10 p.m. in summer) and is a great place to wander through if only to behold the pieces on display.

But this commercial fine art gallery (one of the largest in Western Canada) doesn't just offer up museum quality art and world-class service to a global clientele - it plays an important mentorship role within the Canadian art community.

Through its Artist-in-Residence program, professional artists can take advantage of the gallery's 2,500 square feet of studio space, engage with the public, and work on developing their unique craft in a supportive environment. Artists are treated like valued partners. The gallery also provides scholarships, sponsors a number of charitable organizations and community initiatives, and runs a summer program that includes weekly open studio workshops.

Mountain Galleries works hard to foster Canadian art so that you can not only experience Jasper, but make it a part of your home.

3 ways you can help keep Jasper's wildlife wild

More than 50 mammals call Jasper National Park home, and spotting them in their natural habitat can be magical. But it's important to remember that their continued health and survival relies on us being as respectful as possible. So if you're lucky enough to see a bear, sheep, elk, or any other animal, help Parks Canada maintain healthy populations by following these rules:



Coyote

Do not feed wildlife

Wildlife have evolved to find their own food. But when humans feed wild animals, it teaches them that people provide food. Once the animal has had a taste of human food, it may begin to seek it above all other sources of natural food. Feeding wildlife in a national park is illegal and you can be charged under the Canada National Parks Act, with fines up to \$25,000. This includes feeding them directly by offering them food, or indirectly by leaving garbage behind for them to find. Keep all attractants (including empty food containers, coolers, dog food, and even toiletries) in your vehicle or in designated food storage lockers.

Do not approach wildlife

Always stay 30 metre (3 bus lengths) away from elk and 100 metres (10 bus lengths) away from bears. If you spot animals while driving, do not stop on the road, which can create dangerous "wildlife jams." If there is a generous shoulder, you may pull over, but remain in your vehicle and use binoculars to observe or a telephoto lens to snap that perfect picture before continuing on your way. Approaching wildlife or allowing wildlife to approach you can lead to them no longer being wary of people. Once habituated, they are at greater risk of getting into conflict with people.

Stay on designated trails

Trails in national parks are designed to take you to the most interesting places in the park while keeping you safe from hazards and protecting the environment. Always stay on designated trails and find out about closures from Parks Canada staff in advance. Be prepared to adjust your travel plans if necessary. If traveling with a dog, keep your dog on a leash and under control at all times. Dogs may kill or injure wildlife, or can cause some wild animals to feel threatened and become agitated or aggressive. Studies have shown that dogs off-leash is one of the most common causes of wildlife attacks.





As you enter the gates of Jasper National Park, you may wonder why valleys that were green just a few years ago are now blanketed by a sea of red trees

The red trees have been killed by mountain pine beetle. These tiny insects make their home in pine trees where they lay eggs under the bark, blocking the flow of nutrients in the tree.

Beetle populations sometimes swell to outbreaks, but decline when they run out of trees or freeze in cold winters. Driven by a warming climate and large expanses of aging pines, mountain pine beetles are expanding throughout western North America to northerly areas that were once too cold for many beetles to survive.

A healthy forest actually includes a lot of dead trees

Forests are shaped over time by fire, insects, disease, wind and avalanches. These processes naturally create space in overcrowded forests, recycle old and weak trees into nutrients for regrowth, and create a balanced ecosystem with a diversity of plants and animals.

Many beetle species make their home in standing dead trees. Beetles and their

larvae are important food sources for woodpeckers, whose abandoned nest cavities are used by other birds, bats, and small mammals like flying squirrels and pine martens.

Dead trees also allow more sunlight to reach the forest floor, which nourishes wildflowers and berry bushes - great homes for birds and small mammals. Insects like bees and moths, and mammals like bears and deer feed on these nutrient-rich plants.

Humans and climate change have altered natural processes

Many researchers are investigating what the long term effects of this dramatic landscape change will be in Jasper National Park and across western North America.

If warming climate trends persist, mountain pine beetle will likely continue to thrive and may move into new habitats. Wildfire season is already longer, and the amount of wildfires is increasing, due to climate change. It is not uncommon for smoke from wildfires burning outside the park to affect visibility and air quality in Jasper during the summer. You may notice some of the ways

Parks Canada is dealing with the impacts of mountain pine beetle – removing trees from around town to reduce wildfire risk, removing hazardous trees from campgrounds, and protecting the endangered whitebark pine from attack.

Thriving ecosystems are built around cyclical change

Over time, the red needles will fall to the ground and the grey dead trees will fade into the background. A natural nursery of young pines, spruce, Douglas fir and aspen trees will form the next generation's forest. Some older pines have resisted the pine beetle and their descendants will grow in the place of the beetle killed trees. It's possible that in the future, forests may be more resistant to attack.

While you enjoy this very special place, know that it is undergoing a make-over of sorts – one we think that will only add to the resiliency and beauty of Jasper National Park.

Learn local history at the Jasper Yellowhead Museum & Archives

Rain or shine, blizzard or balmy, it is always a good idea to visit Jasper's local history hub. Not only is the Jasper Yellowhead Museum & Archives a treasure trove of fascinating artefacts and regional research, it also serves as a community touchstone, with high quality exhibits, events, historical talks and other programs that explore the natural and cultural fabric of the national park and Yellowhead Corridor.

Explore the Historical Gallery's permanent exhibits about the Indigenous and Métis people of the area, fur trade, the railway, European exploration, the Japanese first ascent of Mt. Alberta and early tourism. Among other relics, see Yuko Maki's legendary silver ice axe, musket balls

recovered from the Athabasca Pass and believed to belong to Canadian icon David Thompson, and a canoe built by trailblazing outfitter Donald Nelson "Curly" Phillips.

The Showcase Gallery exhibits change throughout the year. From April to the end of May, absorb the work of Colleen Campbell, an artist and former field researcher who has lived in the Canadian Rockies for nearly four decades and whose drawings of bears, coyotes and ravens walk the line between science and metaphysical philosophy.

An exhibit on the history of Whistlers Campground from the 1970's which will run all summer long, while a 100th anniversary exhibit on the Canadian National Railway will start in the summer and run until mid-November. The Annual Festival of Trees fundraiser is from mid-November to mid-December.

From November to March on Tuesdays at 10:30 a.m., gather for the Weekly Coffee Hour, when artefacts from the museum's collection are pulled out for display and conversation.

Once you've gained a deeper understanding of this beautiful place, purchase the perfect souvenir from the museum gift shop, which stocks local books, unique artwork and replicas of historical Jasper keepsakes.

take a bite out of jasper

Cuisines from across Canada mix and mingle in this delicious pocket of the Rocky Mountains. Add to this melting pot of flavours a drool-worthy après-ski scene and a family-friendly culinary history. Whether you're fueling up for a day in the mountains or just savouring the simple pleasures, you're always welcome at our table.



Most days of the week, at select times of the day, the pleasant smell of freshly boiled barley wafts through the restaurant known around town as simply The Brewpub. Unlike probably every other brewery you've ever visited, Jasper Brewing Co. uses real glacier water (and all the minerals that come with it) as the base for its many craft beers, which lends a uniquely winning terroir to its boozy creations.





As the first brewery to open within a Canadian national park, it holds a certain historical distinction. And thanks to a recent top-to-bottom renovation, the Brewpub's decor has stylishly stepped back in time too. With wood panelled walls, custom flower-power artwork and corduroy upholstered booths that look out on the mountains, the whole place evokes a cozy 70's-retro-meetsbarnyard-chic-aesthetic.

The menu features a broad selection of upscale pub fare both classic and contemporary, and thirsty patrons can select one (or many - this is a safe space) of the six staple beers or choose from the rotating seasonal beers. Enjoy a mid-day sip with

mountain views, or imbibe after dark beneath twinkling patio lights. Between May and September the options expand to include the large patio, complete with heaters and generous awning coverage.

The restaurant is kid-friendly until 10 p.m. and open until 1 a.m. (often showing the latest game on the big screens). Growlers are available for recurrent fans.

Open since 1927, this community hub is the perfect place to unwind with a beer and good meal (the pub burger is legendary), play a round of pool, or just catch the latest mountain gossip. Jasper's history lives here, with vintage artifacts and historical images displayed on the wall — including one section devoted entirely to photos of friends and family who lost their lives in the mountains. Sometimes a quiet familiar haven of comfort food, sometimes a hoppin' party with live music and regional brews, this is one gem that mustn't be missed.


Jasper Food Tours

Foodies, history buffs and cultural explorers will all find something to love about this new culinary experience. Led by longtime local Estelle Blanchette, Jasper Food Tours introduces diners to Jasper through storytelling, while also filling your belly with delicious food and drink. The daily, year-round three hour walking and eating journey takes participants to four local restaurants and many Jasper landmarks (total distance walked is 1.5 km.)

The featured restaurants remain a mystery until the minute you find yourself on their doorstep, but trust that each one is unique and special to Jasper, not to mention delicious. Each stop serves up a generous dish of food alongside an equally prodigious pour of the good stuff. The menu is kept a surprise, but includes wild game meats, local brews, Canadian classics and globally-inspired treats (note: it can be customized in advance for vegetarian and gluten free preferences).

Packed with fascinating facts and local stories (and capped at twelve people per excursion) each tour feels like a fun and intimate afternoon out with friends. Bonus: you'll finish stuffed

Maligne Canyon Wilderness Kitchen

Without hearty, nourishing food, enjoying adventure becomes a struggle. That's why, when executive chef Martin Brenner was crafting the brand new menu for the freshly overhauled restaurant at Maligne Canyon, he took inspiration from the simple, delicious fare that fueled Jasper's early explorers.

Think slow-smoked meats, handmade preserves, fresh local veggies and the timeless warmth of comfort food. Pickling, canning, curing and smoking were common methods used a century ago by adventurers like Mary Schäffer as they hit the mountainous backcountry for weeks on end. Those handcrafted techniques lend a unique authenticity to an eatery

that's located - where else - on the brink of one of the most jaw-dropping wildernesses around.

By day, stop in for coffee or a quick bite before venturing down the canyon; to-go picnic lunches are another option if you're en route to adventure. By night, as the sun sets and the pace slows, Maligne Canyon Wilderness Kitchen shines - lively entertainment and inviting fire pits on the patio add extra flavour to the already mouth-watering appetizers, mulled wine and family style platters.

Eating family style fosters a fun closeness around the table that, in addition to enabling sampling of multiple house specialties (don't miss the 16-hour slow cooked BBQ Alberta

beef brisket), often cultivates the most engaging storytelling.

Alberta-sourced meats dominate here. Many cuts that are often considered 'secondary' elsewhere are showcased with a specially-developed dry rub that's rich in flavour. The meat is then smoked in-house with local woods on a daily basis; the results are incredibly tender and tasty.

Indeed, if a day of exploring the majestic Maligne Valley is the meal, then an evening dining experience at the Wilderness Kitchen is the perfect dessert.

Athabasca Hotel

The oldest hotel in town — with its towering stone facade and 98 years of history — could be a poster child for the wisdom of not judging a book by its cover. Upon stepping into the lobby, many are surprised by the colourful character of the interior, little of which is perceptible from the street.

With charming Victorian furniture and wall-mounted taxidermies of the national park's iconic megafauna (most of which were donated decades ago) not to mention a storied past of hosting people like Marilyn Monroe and Bing Crosby, it's a place worth exploring regardless if you're staying the night. Pop in to the on-site O'Shea's Restaurant & Sports Lounge for a hearty portion of traditional Canadian cuisine, or just enjoy a cup of coffee in the unique surroundings.



But the Athabasca's old world flare belies its many new world conveniences. Uploading vacation photos is a cinch thanks to the hotel's fibre optic internet and each room has satellite TV.

This boutique heritage hotel has come a long way since its humble beginnings as a rooming house above a grocery store and ladies wear shop. But although it is proud of its modern comforts and exceptional service, it has retained some historical ties: the rooms are modest in size, if not in personality. Each is exquisitely and

HI Jasper

There are no strangers at a hostel, only friends you've yet to meet. And meeting friends is almost too easy at this new HI hostel, with a beautiful, fully equipped communal kitchen, comfortable hang-out spaces, and fun programming like guided hikes, Jam Nights and more.

Originally located partway up Whistlers Mountain, the new location is a walkable distance from the train station and more convenient for travelers without access to a car. Built from scratch, this affordable accommodation is fully wheelchair

accessible and will add more private room options. Other lodging options include shared rooms for four and family rooms.

But you didn't come to Jasper to sit in a room. Early check-ins can stash luggage and head straight out for adventures. When you return, keep your bike or skis in the hostel's dedicated storage and relax in the fireplace lounge or in the sauna, grab a bite at the on-site cafe or just take in the views from the patios. Find new adventure pals in the media room or games room (there's even a meeting

room, for professional pals). Cook for yourself in the hostel's large kitchen or BBQ outside.

A stay at HI Hostel also means additional discounts around town, including: 20% off Jasper Rafting Adventures and 15% off lift tickets, rentals and ski lessons from Marmot Basin. Save further by getting a HI Hostel membership, which earns cheaper rates at HI Hostel locations around the world.

Mount Robson Inn

The only thing more mouthwatering than this hotel's hot breakfast buffet is the deep sleep you'll get on its luxurious pillow-top mattresses. Family owned and operated, the Mount Robson Inn is located on the side of town closest to the lcefields Parkway (its sister hotel bookends the journey in Lake Louise) and caters just as easily to vacationers with young children as it does to road tripping motorcyclists.

The former group can use a playpen/crib, highchair, night light and/or plug covers for

free (request these amenities at time of booking to ensure availability) or reserve a child-friendly custom suite with a

separate, bunk bed-furnished room. A jogging stroller is even available to rent for \$15 per day.

The latter group of motorcyclists will feel very welcomed here, since the hotel's owner is an avid rider. Upon check in, receive a microfiber cloth for cleaning the road grime from your hog. Wash it more thoroughly at the dedicated washing station, then park it right in front of your room or in a rentable garage for greater security. Don't have a ride of your own? Guests staying at the Mount Robson Inn will receive a 15% discount on all two day motorcycle rentals from Jasper Motorcycle Tours.


Oh, and about that breakfast buffet. Complementary for all guests, and served in a newly renovated room that overlooks the mountains, this deluxe morning feast offers up the following in addition to continental basics: omelets, sausage or other breakfast protein, granola, yogurt, toaster station, fresh croissants and danishes and gluten-free baked goods.

Cabin culture

Quintessentially Canadian and oh-so-cozy, Jasper's love for cabin living is inextricably entwined with the national park's history (see page right) and is continually evolving via modern accommodations (such as below).









Bear Hill Lodge

Ask the uninitiated, and they'll say cabins are made mostly of wood. But people who have had the privilege of staying at Bear Hill Lodge know that a cabin is also built with much less tangible materials: love, heritage and intimacy. There's intimacy with loved ones, certainly (the cozy communal spaces can't help but foster togetherness) but also an intimacy with the outdoors. As standalone structures, there's little to separate you from the jaw-dropping environment that is Jasper National Park.

As the only rentable cabins located intown, Bear Hill Lodge doesn't sacrifice convenience for natural setting; the network of energy-efficient cottages, chalets and homestead houses are

all a walkable distance from Jasper's restaurants and most activities.

The property's first cabins were built in 1946, when the Icefields Parkway was young and cabin living was common. In the 70+ years since, the accommodation options have expanded and parties of one to nine can now bunk down in lodgings of various sizes.

There has also been an evolution of style. While real fireplaces and earthy furnishings maintain the rustic cabin vibes of yesteryear, curated artwork and chic decor touches lend a modern feel to the cozy spaces. Rich in texture and honest comforts, each cabin is unlike any other.

Fully equipped kitchens and luxurious duvets facilitate snug evenings in, and a dog-friendly policy (with advance reservation and pet fee) means memories from the retreat will include truly the entire family.

Jasper's earliest cabin dwellers might've lacked the plentiful electrical outlets and top notch insulation offered by Bear Hill Lodge, but the passion for living simply and in harmony with nature has carried forward from then to now. This new wave of handcrafted cabins brings a fresh approach to homesteading one that you'll want to call home.

The Fairmont

rustic retreat



At their most basic, cabins are shelter. In Jasper, a wilderness of magnificent proportions, that core function has historically been the priority. Somewhere along the way, cabin lifestyle became seen as much more — a utopia, where modern day stresses vanish into the sky — and although it's entirely possible Jasper's first cabin inhabitants saw their homes in the woods as a blissful escape from convention, they likely focused on more utilitarian concerns.

Jasper Park Lodge legacy began in 1915, with ten large wooden tents on the shores of Lac Beauvert; it was known as "Tent City."

Consider Lewis Swift, Jasper's first game and fire guardian, who married Métis woman Suzette Swift (see her famous beadwork and finely embroidered buckskin clothing at the Jasper Yellowhead Museum and Archives (p.37) and set up a homestead near Pyramid Mountain that catered to Jasper's first tourists. The cabins they built are good examples of the functional construction and rustic aesthetic that epitomized Jasper's early development. Low, square, one-story structures with a gable roof and horizontal logs, they speak to the architectural character of the era. Today, those cabins are a part of a National Training Centre for national park employees.

Located just five minutes from the east gate of Jasper National Park, Pocahontas Cabins is near the original mine site trail of Pocahontas.

> Jasper's story is so woven with cabins that even its name is linked to them. Jasper Hawse was a former operator of a trading post (which also eventually took his name, becoming Jasper House). Over time, the trading post's wooden structures were reabsorbed into the park as building materials by settlers and railroad workers, though the meadow where it sat remains a National Historic Site.

Cabins are everywhere in Jasper National Park. Some, like the luxurious chalets at the Fairmont Jasper Park Lodge (p.50), have been retrofitted and modernized. Others are sprinkled through the backcountry, long abandoned and quietly disintegrating back into the

The outdoor aesthetic may have been adopted into the mainstream imagination, but nowhere is cabin culture more original, authentic and treasured than in the Canadian Rockies.



Colonel Thomas Jefferies Avarne Walkeden established a bungalow camp at Cottonwood Creek in 1936; today it's called Pine Bungalows.

This cabin is one of many built by Lewis and Suzette Swift, a married couple with a big impact on Jasper's early





landscape. development.

Astoria Hotel

With its sharply gabled roof set against a mountainous backdrop, the Astoria Hotel is immediately recognizable. It is also one of oldest hotels in Jasper, with an extraordinary legacy: the Andrew family has run the place ever since it opened in 1925 under the name Hotel Cavell (it was renamed two years later after the hotel opened a 'beer parlour' and authorities deemed it improper to keep using the name of heroic war nurse Edith Cavell).

That beer parlour eventually expanded and was redubbed the **De'd Dog Bar & Grill**. Now it's one of the most popular and beloved watering holes in town, and serves up an excellent selection of local beer and stick-to-your-ribs comfort food. Come to unwind with a round of pool after a day of playing in the mountains, or get to know some Jasper lifers in their natural habitat.

At the end of the night, it's a hopskip to your room in the adjoining hotel. The Astoria's rooms are cozy, comfortable and clean, with some offering mountain views and others offering the quietest sleep ever thanks to an insulated placement within the building. Dogs are permitted in certain rooms for a small fee.

In the morning, descend the stairs (the absence of an elevator adds to the lodging's historical feel) to **Papa George's Restaurant**, which

Winter stay-andski packages give discounts on both your room and lift pass. Hotel also offers ski storage and shuttles to Marmot Basin. has one of the best breakfasts in town (the lunch and dinner also come highly recommended). With trails aplenty and multiple dog-friendly accommodation options, bringing your furry friend to Jasper can make the trip extra memorable. Here's some stuff to know beforehand, so you can make the adventure as wonderful for your pooch as it is for you.

- 1. Parks Canada regulations state that all domestic animals must be kept on a leash or in suitable confinement at all times. Pets are not to be left unattended on campsites or in vehicles. Allowing your pet to chase any wild animal in the Park is an offence. Remember to clean up after your pet.
- 2. A fully fenced off-leash dog park is located on the other side of the train tracks from downtown Jasper, at the intersection of Sleepy Hollow Rd. and Hazel Ave.
- 3. There are some trails in Jasper where dogs are not allowed (even on a leash) because the area encroaches on endangered caribou territory. Nodogs-allowed trails include: Leach Lake cross-country ski trail, Skyline Trail, Tonquin Valley, Cavell Meadows Trail, Bald Hills, and Opal Hills.
- **4.** Need to find a dog-sitter? Pending sitter availability, My Jasper Nanny will care for your pooch from 1.5 hours to overnight durations. Fill out a booking request form at myjaspernanny.ca

On the leash rules

It's really important that dogs are always on a leash and under control. The regulation was made for both the safety of the dogs and for the safety of the national park's wildlife. The dog doesn't have to bring the animal down by the throat — just chasing it can threaten the animal's life for a variety of reasons.

On planning ahead

People come to Jasper and want to try various activities, and then realize they can't take their dog along. There's lots of great things to do with your dog, but if you're going to be doing a bunch of stuff you can't take your dog on, maybe your dog should stay home. Decide what kind of trip you want before you leave.



On dog friendly options

You can take your dog on the SkyTram (p. 07), which I think is really cool. Hiking is also a great thing to do (healthy too!) and I like to have a dog with me in the backcountry; sometimes they can alert you to the presence of bears, which is very useful so long as they're leashed.




